ROAD WORKS IN DOWN LANE

Thames Water will be carrying out water mains replacement work in Down Lane, commencing on Monday 29th October and lasting approximately 7 weeks until 10th December. The water pipes have burst 8 times over the last two years, which has necessitated these major engineering works. This will take place in two phases between 7am and 6pm Monday to Friday, 9am to 2pm Saturday and 9am to 1pm Sunday. Access for pedestrians, dismounted cyclists and equestrians will be maintained at all times. Vehicular access for emergency vehicles, residences and businesses will be maintained via the diversion route, which will be signed. There will also be limited access for residents but please allow extra time to reach your properties as equipment may have to be moved to allow you in and out. If you know that there is a specific time when you need to leave your house, it is worth telling the workmen in advance so that they are prepared.

Phase One: Starting on Monday 29th October. Road closed from the Compton end of Down Lane up to the pond outside Watts Gallery.

Phase Two: Starting during the week commencing 19 November. Road closed from the pond to the top of Down Lane. Thames Water have agreed NOT to work on Sunday 4th, Sunday 11th and Saturday & Sunday 24th & 25th November.

 - ➤ BELL RINGING. Compton Tower has recently welcomed two new recruits. One has returned to ringing after a break of 47 years (!) and the other is learning the skill for the first time. Together with the established team, they will be ringing at 12.30pm on Sunday 11th November to celebrate the centenary of the Armistice. Compton is one of numerous towers taking part in this act of respect; church bells throughout the British Isles and further afield will be heard at this time. Earlier in the day, the bells will be rung half-muffled for the Service of Remembrance. When the church bells rang out on 11 November 1918 to announce the end of the war, 1400 bell ringers, from all walks life, had perished in the conflict – a small fraction of the total killed in the war but a significant proportion of the ringing community. To commemorate them, one of the Compton ringers, Anne Nixon, has crocheted 1400 woollen poppies and they will be displayed in the church during November.

The next ringing practices will be held at Compton on Tuesday 13th November and at Puttenham on Tuesday 20th November, both at 8pm. Learners and returners are very welcome. Contact Phil Gorton on 01483 420763, phil.gorton@btinternet.com, if you are interested.

REVIEW OF CLT'S DINNER & DRAMA TWO PLAYS WHAT GO WRONG

I must admit to some curiosity as to what Compton Little Theatre's latest offering was going to be all about. However, within minutes I was laughing at the wonderfully crafted humour and tongue in cheek, coarse acting in the two pieces, **PRESENT**

SLAUGHTER followed by A FISH IN HER KETTLE.

In PRESENT SLAUGHTER, we see a variety of characters living in a Noel Coward world of feigned affections and crisp diction. Steven Webb was brilliant as Oliver with his delicate affectations and prim and proper mannerisms. Lavinia, played by Lucy Watson, was a deliciously crafted performance, excellent dancing and speech patterns as clear as an art deco cocktail glass. Roger Smithers played the short-sighted (Les Dawson styled) Pianist with great skill, visual humour and a constantly changing array of facial expressions. Antoine (Robin Matthews) gave a hilarious and physical performance with a lovely line describing dragging a fellow actor across the floor as being like "dragging a wet croissant". Mimi (Polly Murray) was an excellent Maid who caused much laughter and sauce. Tennis players Binky (Andrew Payne) and Bunny (Gayle Lafone) were very funny as over the top, 'jolly hockey stick' characters. The hilarity was topped off by the Paramedic (Julia Foster) who administered heart massage in a musically rhythmic way, and Prompt (Gaye Culmer) who acted with aplomb all the way through the action on stage.

This was followed by **A FISH IN HER KETTLE**. Set in a stylised Paris, with a wonderful Eiffel Tower painted on the scenery, this was an eclectic cocktail of farce, witty plays with dialogue, *Acorn Antiques*, *Benny Hill* and physical pranks. In this piece we saw a House Manager, Jane Turner, who was certainly not to be messed with! Felix (Robin Matthews) was again superb and physical with a particular tumble that Del Boy Trotter would have been proud of. Antoinette, played by Gayle Lafone, was a controlled tour de force with several moments of great timing. Victor was played by Andrew Payne who had a wonderfully inane smile throughout and was always in his stylised character, which was a joy to watch.

Doctor Henri (Noel Ruddy) was a shaking, short-sighted character who got himself into all sorts of trouble. Noel played him with great skill and he must surely be a contender for the next "Should have gone to Specsavers" advert? Hugo Wilson cast a striking figure as Captain Bidet and he should be rightly flushed with pride. Mandy Scully was an excellent Eugenie with a great delivery of "La Grippe". Sue Leach was a powerful Lucille with strong diction as she pronounced to Victor "How strong your arms are!" Steven Webb was an hilarious Count Otto and Julia Foster again gave another lovely performance as the Cook. It concluded with the Merry Minstrels of Polly Murray, Roger Smithers and Lucy Watson who were suitably coarse in the final bows. Gaye Culmer, once again played the Prompt with skill and good timing.

As usual with Compton Little Theatre, the two productions had creative and high-quality scenery, lighting, sound, props, costumes and make up and no doubt an army of stage crew who all performed seamlessly. The management of props and the recycling of bloodied clothes was mind-boggling! The two directors, Gordon Ayshford and Clive Grant, should rightly feel very proud and they both deserve special praise.

Together with copious quantities of delicious food provided by Jo Ayshford and Rhona Wilkie, a slick Front of House team effortlessly moving among the crowded tables, and a table groaning with raffle prizes, Compton Little Theatre once again showed it had a big heart and produced a wonderful evening of wit, entertainment, fun and laughter.

In an exploration of the celebrated Victorian poet's significant connection with visual art, this new exhibition will bring together paintings, illustrations, works on paper and photography. Presenting portraits of the poet and highlights of the many visual images inspired by her words – alongside her own intriguing and virtually unknown drawings – it will consider Christina Rossetti's complex attitude to visual art, recognising the enduring appeal of her verse to visual artists from the 1850s through to the present day.
