


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

## Compton Celebrates the Coronation of King Edward VII in June 1902



The national festivities celebrating the Coronation of Edward VII continued despite the absence of Edward himself (who suffered a burst appendix 3 days prior to the event. Edward ascended the throne aged 59, following the death of his mother Queen Victoria. Real name Prince of Wales, Albert, Edward, he omitted the name Albert out of respect for his father.

King Edward VII lived a bohemian, liberal lifestyle with many mistresses including actress Lillie Langtree and Alice Keppel. It is thought that his wife, Queen Alexandra, knew and accepted these relationships.

In many ways a progressive individual, he did not however approve of 'votes for women'.



Queen Victoria ascended to the throne aged just 18. In 1840 she married Albert, they had 9 children and when he died in 1861 she mourned for the remainder of her lifetime. The British Empire included Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and parts of Africa as well as India from 1877. Queen Victoria was the longest reigning British Monarch. Her Golden Jubilee was in 1887 and the Diamond Jubilee was in 1897

## George Frederick Watts - Painter, Sculptor & Philanthropist 1817 - 1904



IN MEMORIAM

G. F. WATTS, O.M., R.A.

"Antœus drew fresh strength when east to his mother Earth."

July 1, 1904.

Born in Marylebone London, George Frederick Watts moved to Compton in 1891 after marrying his 2nd wife, Mary Fraser Tytler, where he died.

Watts was the son of a piano maker and was named after Handel with whom he shared the same birth date.

Watts work is linked to that of the 'symbolist' movement inspired by Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel following a period living in Italy and later, Rossetti. Good friends of Tennyson and Henry Thoby Prinsep he accepted Valentine Prinsep as one of only artists ever to study under the master himself.

After a brief marriage to actress Ellen Terry who was 30 years his junior, he eventually married artist Mary Fraser Tytler when he was 69 and she 36.

He twice refused the baronetcy by Queen Victoria but accepted the 'Order of Merit' in 1902. Before his death he and Mary set up the only UK Gallery for a single artist in the village of Compton in Surrey.

His last painting 'The All Pervading' was completed shortly before he died and it hung at the alter of the chapel, designed by Mary and where their remains now lie.



#### War Memorial Unveiled - Designed by Mrs. F G Watts

*In the presence of two or three hundred spectators, Compton's unique war* memorial was unveiled on Sunday afternoon by Brigadier-General F C Longbourne, C.M.G., D.S.O. The first part of the service was conducted by the Rector (the Rev. A B Gwynn) in the church. Special accommodation was reserved for the ex-Servicemen, Boy Scouts, under Scoutmaster E Bowyer and Girl Guides, under Miss Bubb, who afterwards preceded the congregation to the gate of the churchyard, where the memorial has been erected. The service was of extreme simplicity. Dedication by the Rector followed the unveiling and after the hymn, 'Think, O Lord, in mercy' had been sung, four buglers of the "Queen's" Regiment sounded the "Last Post" and the "Reveille". The proceeding terminated with the National Anthem.

On the two sides nearest the road the base of the memorial bears the names of the eleven men whose sacrifice is commemorated;- Michael Chapman, George Maurice Gillett, George Horlock, William Hounsome, Arthur Cyril Lawson, Andrew Soyer Marchant, Thomas Marshall, Albert Harry May, Henry Pink, Walter Pink, Sydney Pink, William Rogers, George Henry Hall Scott, Jesse Stovold and St Thomas Stovold. On the Icon is inscribed this message; "In honoured memory of the men of Compton who gave their lives in the Great War, 1914-1918."

Beneath the remaining names people are reminded that "through the ages one clear name of sacrifice has burned, and by its light men see God." Among those present at the ceremony were Mrs. G F Watts, Mr. & Mrs. Hagart Speirs, Mrs. And Miss Longbourne, Mr. and Mrs. Elger, Mrs. S How, Mrs. Harker-Taylor, Mrs. Williams, W. K. Darley, P. J Sparrow, F. A. Kellam, C. Lymposs, A. F. Jackson, F. Betser, and A Bullen.

An especially gratifying feature is the unanimity with which Mrs. Watts' scheme has been accepted by the parish as a whole. Now that the memorial is completed and the public are able to see and judge for themselves, nothing but praise for the beautiful design and the skilled execution is heard.

SATISFACTORY FINANCIAL RESULT





#### BEAUTY AND CONVENIENCE

Major Rudkin proposed thanks to Lady Boston. As chairman of the building committee, he said, no one was more fully aware than he how much was due to her advice and assistance that Compton possessed to-day, among its many other blessings, a hall which, he was justified in saying, was unsurpassed for beauty of design and for convenience and general utility. Lady Boston was also the historian of Compton, and her interesting and valuable book would remain a lasting monument to her good works. It was therefore particularly fitting that she should be invited to open the hall.

When, five months ago, Mrs. Watts, for whom all had such a great regard, laid the foundation stone those who had seen the plans and designs were confident that the hall would be worthy of its beautiful surroundings. It had even surpassed their expectations, and their thanks were due to their architect, Mr. Laurence Powell, whose absence through illness they deeply regretted, and to Messrs. David Fry and Son, the builders, and their employees for having so ably carried out Mr. Powell's designs.

Little Pamela Parsons then presented a bouquet to Lady Boston.

#### A MODEL HALL

Lord Boston responded on behalf of her ladyship, and said she was ready and anxious to do all that lay in her power for the welfare of the village, and in this he associated himself with her. He joined in congratulations on the completion of the hall. In its external appearance it was in harmony with its surroundings and an ornament to a beautiful village, and in its internal arrangements provision had been made for every possible requirement. In fact, the hall was a model of what a village hall should be.





It was up to the residents to see that its maintenance was provided for, through the endowment fund and other such arrangements as the committee thought appropriate. Experience showed that, while it was often easy to start an undertaking, it was by no means so easy to carry it on when the first enthusiasm abated. If they could put the maintenance of the hall upon a sound footing it would prove a powerful factor for good in the social and, he hoped, the educational life of the parish. Lord Boston then proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Day for providing the refreshments and entertainment that evening, and spoke of the work Mr. Day had done as hon. treasurer of the building fund.

HALLO W TALLING THEIR DILOUIG DO.

General More-Molyneux seconded the thanks. He said that Compton was extraordinarily lucky in having many friends, and it had no better friends than Mr. and Mrs. Day.

#### VARIOUS EFFORTS

Mr. Day responded, and said since the idea of a hall started three years ago it had sometimes seemed an impossibility, but Compton had many friends, and they had been able to do it. He did not think there had been sufficient appreciation of the work done in that village by collecting money through trading shillings-which realised £54-through sales of produce and through sales of work. They (Mr. and Mrs. Day) were associated with Mr. and Mrs. Hagart Speirs and Mrs. Watts in originating the scheme, and they felt they would like "to be there at the finish." The actual arrangements for the concert and refreshments, however, had been made by those two very energetic persons, Major and Mrs. Rudkin. In recognition of this he presented Mrs. Rudkin with a basket of flowers.

The Rector proposed thanks to Mr. How for presiding and for his work in connection with the hall.

## LADY BOSTON PERFORMS CEREMONY

#### COMPTON'S THREE YEARS' TASK COMPLETED

An object for which Compton had been working and planning for three years was completed on Thursday, when the new Village Hall was crowded to its far-from-meagre capacity for the opening ceremony, which

was performed by Lady Boston.

Mr. Charles How (chairman of the hall committee) presided, supported by Lord and Lady Boston, Mrs. G. F. Watts, the Rector (the Rev. H. Highley) and Mrs. Highley, Brigadier-General and Mrs. F. C. More-Molyneux, Major H. R. E. Rudkin (chairman of the building committee) and Mrs. Rudkin, Mr. G. H. Day (hon. treasurer of the building fund and chairman of the Parish Council) and Mrs. Day, Mr. F. G. Norris (hon. secretary, Village Hall committee), and Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Powell. Mr. and Mrs. Day entertained the company to refreshments and provided an enjoyable concert by London artists.

#### TRULY MAGNIFICENT

Mr. How described the new hall as "a truly magnificent building," and thanked those who had designed and built it and those who so generously helped to raise the funds. He had had a telegram from one of the greatest benefactors, Mr. Prinsep, which said: "All good wishes to your opening ceremony."

An endowment fund, continued the speaker, had been started, and already reached £10. They hoped this fund would be quickly augmented, and he asked those who loved their beautiful village to help this fund.

Mr. How made special mention of the secretary, Mr. Norris (applause), whose dearest wish had been that Compton should have a village hall, and his work had been noble; Major Rudkin, to whose advice and skill was due the fact that they had what he (Mr. How) considered the best Village Hall anywhere; Mrs. Terry, who was unable to be present through illness, and all were sorry she could not see the first use made of the crockery she had presented; and Mr. Day, their host. They could see the result of his work as trustee, with Mr. A. A. Hagart Speirs and Lord Boston.

"We have a Village Hall," said Mr. How, "of which everyone must be very proud indeed. It is up to us to look after it. From the youngest to the oldest inhabitants, we must feel that it belongs to us, and then we shall make it the success we all wish it to be."

Mr. How then welcomed Lady Boston, who, he said, by her charm and by the great interest she showed in the village life, had endeared herself to everyone. No one could be better fitted to open the hall.

#### A GREAT DAY

After the Rector had pronounced a blessing on the hall, Lady Boston said she felt it was a great day in the long history of Compton, and she deeply appreciated the compliment paid to her by the management committee in asking her to open that lovely hall. "May it fulfil all our hopes and anticipations," she said, "and be a means of drawing together more closely the dwellers in our lovely village of Compton. That is my hope and prayer.



#### TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES


Sir,—In these days of rapid change, which under present conditions seems likely to increase in intensity, it becomes ever of greater importance to preserve as far as we can the records of the past. We have our Record Societies to serve the purpose of saving from destruction documents of historical and genealogical value, but it seems to me that something more is required to safeguard papers of more personal interest, such as attaches

to records of purely local affairs.




